Welcome to the spring edition of our newsletter.

The new Aged Care Quality Standards (which cover both residential and community care) have provided us with an opportunity to review the way we deliver care and services.

These standards should give renewed hope to people entering care because services are targeted more specifically to ensure that each individual is supported to live the life they choose. Although we believe our organisation has always done this well, it is evident by listening to stories coming from the Royal Commission, that this has not been the case for all organisations. It is important to be receptive to new ideas because even the best care can be made better and at Barunga Village, this is our commitment to those we care for.

In line with the new standards are new mandatary requirements from the Government such as the National Quality Indicator Program. This program requires all residential homes to have specific reporting requirements to measure certain aspects of service provisions such as unexplained weight loss, the use of physical restraint and pressure injuries. Barunga Homes has implemented new systems and complied with all the requirements to collect this data.

We are also continuing to develop clinical governance and diversity frameworks which support the requirements of the new standards.

We have just welcomed our new intake of trainees who are undertaking their Certificate III in Individual Support (Personal Care Worker). They are adjusting well to life at Barunga Village and we hope their training will instill a life

time love for the Aged Care industry.

We were pleased to offer ongoing employment to five trainees from our last intake who proudly uphold our values of trust, respect and kindness.

Our current building project at Barunga Homes is on schedule to be completed by the end of March 2020. A new house of eight rooms for people living with dementia will compliment our existing model of dementia care by enabling us to have three Butterfly Homes - Dale, Eyre and soon-to-be Renni House.

The expansion will not increase the capacity of people we currently care for as we will be decommissioning some older rooms and using them for other purposes.

We have a group of House Members living upstairs in Evelyn House who are our building inspectors and oversee the construction of Renni House on a daily basis.

It was lovely to see many of you at the Yorke Peninsula Field Days. In our competitive environment it is important we are out and about informing people why we believe Barunga Village will best service their needs. There are not many organisations who can boast retirement living, in home care, residential and respite care which enables us to support people requiring entry level services such as house cleaning through to palliative care.

We enjoy building relationships with people and assisting them to transition into additional services as their needs change.

Work has started into developing our next strategic

plan which will provide our strategic direction for 2021 – 2025. We recently commenced our consultation sessions and our wish is to engage with as many consumers, families and community members as possible in the forthcoming months.

We have a dedicated Light Up Barunga committee who have been working tirelessly since last year to bring you an even better display of lights this year. Please keep Friday 22 November free to join us as we turn on our lights and bring some Christmas joy to the community.

On 27 August, Barunga Village celebrated the seven people who successfully completed their traineeship, and are now qualified aged care workers.

Many attended the graduation ceremony including the trainees, their families, House Members, colleagues, Board Members and respected dignitaries. It was an opportunity to reflect on the hard work and dedication of the trainees over the 12-month program.

After the ceremony, an afternoon tea was enjoyed as we mingled with a new group of trainees who recently commenced the traineeship program.

We are immensely proud of how successful the first year of the program has been to develop aged carers in the region and Barunga Village aims to continue this program to meet community needs.

Also in August, we had Atlas McNeil Healthcare visit Barunga Homes to provide nursing and care staff with education on pressure area and skin care.

They provided best practice tips on the latest care products available, how to apply them and what to look for when assessing skin.

On-going education by our suppliers is valuable to our House Members and Community Clients to ensure our nursing and care staff are up-to-date with the latest care techniques.

It is of the upmost importance to us to listen to the needs of our clients and one House Member submitted an idea for improvement through the Tell Us What You Think form, suggesting staff have a better understanding of dining etiquette and how to appropriately set a dining table.

In response to this suggestion, we worked with the House Member to develop a dining setting and etiquette guide and used this with the House Member in attendance, to run a training session with staff.

Many staff were not accustomed to formally setting a dining table, so were appreciative to have the House Member share her knowledge, to help the staff better meet her and other House Member needs.

Letters from the Bush: Cobb and Co

~ Part 2~

After a few years Freeman Cobb sold his share in the company and went back to the USA where he became a Senator. After that he went to South Africa and set up Cobb and Co in that country. In all Cobb and Co existed in Australia, South Africa, New Zealand and Japan. It was never set up in the USA mainly because the four original partners decided it wouldn't be right to go in competition to the coach companies that gave them their start in life.

After a successful start in Victoria they took the company to New South Wales and then to Queensland where it proved to be a roaring success. By now all the original owners had sold their share in the company, but others bought into the business and kept it going from strength to strength. One man who was to have an even bigger influence was also an American citizen. His name was James Rutherford and it was under his quidance that Cobb and Co became known as one of the best coaching companies in the world.

While the railways were spreading out over much of Australia, Cobb and Co didn't try and compete with them, they added a feeder service to where ever the railways terminus was located. It was this reliability that meant that Cobb and Co received without quibble any mail contract they tended for.

The best years for Cobb and Co would have been from the late 1870 through to just after the first World War. Under Rutherford's tutelage they had built their own coach building factories made their own harness, bred their own horses and trained their own drivers. At their peak, they harnessed 6000 horses and traveled over 25,000 miles a year. Their largest coach was the Leviathan which carried over 30 passengers and used a team of 22 horses to pull it.

Why was Cobb and Co so successful? It was the original owner's foresight in "Horses for Courses". On flat open ground 4,5 or 6 horses would pull a coach. In hilly country and or boggy type roads 8,9 or 12 horses would pull the same coach.

In hilly country the change stations were even closer than on the flat open plains.

Because of this most Cobb and Co horses would get along at a fast trot or even a slow canter. They were nearly always on time. As a coach entered the out skirts of a town the driver would give a blast on a bugle. This was to notify the change station that they were about to pull up for a horse change. It was said a well drilled change station staff could change a team of six horses in under five minutes.

All good things must come to an end and on 14 August 1924 the last Cobb and Co coach ran from Surat to Yuleba. My mother was one of the few people I knew who had ridden in a Cobb and Co coach when she was a girl. To this day a Cobb and Co bus company still exists but it is only a ghost of those heady years of the late 1800's.

Will we ever see it's like again? I very much doubt it.

Bureaucracy and political interference would place too many work place and safety laws in its way. Over the years mechanical horse power has taken over from real horse power.

Which was the most notable and romantic? I will leave you to be the judge of that. I tend to side with the real horse power.




Public Consultation (2021-2025 Strategic Plan)

Recipe

Chargrilled chicken and pineapple salad

Serves 4

thinly sliced

Preparation time: 30 minutes Cooking time: 45 minutes

1 small red onion, thinly sliced

1/3 cup (80ml) pineapple juice
1 tablespoon brown sugar
1 tablespoon soy sauce
500g chicken thigh fillets, chopped
1 small pineapple, peeled, thinly sliced
crossways
200g pkt 4 leaf salad
250g cherry tomatoes, halved
1 carrot, peeled, cut into long matchsticks

1 Lebanese cucumber, halved lengthways,

- 1 Combine the pineapple juice, sugar and soy sauce in a large bowl. Add the chicken and toss to coat. Set aside for 10 mins to develop the flavours. Thread the chicken pieces onto 4 metal skewers. Reserve the marinade.
- **2** Heat a barbecue grill or chargrill on medium -high. Cook the chicken skewers for 3-4 mins each side or until golden brown and cooked through. Transfer to a plate and cover with foil. Set aside for 5 mins to rest.
- **3** Meanwhile, cook pineapple on grill for 2 mins each side or until lightly charred.
- **4** While the pineapple is cooking, place the reserved marinade in a small saucepan. Bring to the boil over high heat. Cook for 3 mins or until mixture thickens slightly. Set aside to cool.
- **5** Arrange salad leaves, tomato, carrot, onion, cucumber, pineapple and chicken skewers on a large serving plate. Pour over marinade in the pan. Season.
