After serving in the Infantry 2/27th Battalion, seeing Egypt, Palestine, Lebanon and Papua-New Guinea, Mr Ebsary discharged in 1945.

In 1947, Mr Ebsary married Vida Jean Noble, and then became a father to June, Peter, Jennifer and Allan.

He was heavily involved with the district, where he fulfilled multiple presidency roles and was a dedicated member of community over the years.

To celebrate the wonderful life Mr Ebsary leads, he and his family celebrated at the Port Broughton Hotel on Sunday prior to his birthday, he also enjoyed an afternoon tea on his birthday with family and friends.

On 15 October, family and friends gathered at the Port Broughton Sporting Club for the major celebration—Mr Ebsary's 100th birthday party.

Letters from the Bush: Nobby Buckley

In this era of Political Correctness this would never have happened, but if it had, some bureaucrat would have had a field day finding a reason to sue somebody.

In 1938 my mother, with me in tow, had to fly to Adelaide to see her sick father. In those days Guinea Airways was the regular plane service between Broken Hill and Adelaide. They flew Broken Hill, Mildura, Renmark and ended at Parafield.

The chief pilot of Guinea Airways was a young man called Nobby Buckley. My mother had flown with him before and knew him personally.

My mother glanced at the two nursing sisters and she could see they were looking rather apprehensive.

After a lot of rummaging around, he suddenly took a notebook from his pocket and said "here are some rough notes I wrote down yesterday, I hope I got it right".

He started up and taxied for a takeoff. The plane was a twin engine De Havilland Rapide, a wood and cloth type aircraft, which was very noisy when in flight.

After they had taken off, he turned to my mother and yelled "excuse me lady, have you ever flown this route before?"

My mother yelled back, "yes I have".

"Good" he said, "which way do I go?"

My mother pointed in the general direction of Renmark and he said, "thanks, that's a big help".

When they reached Renmark and they were circling the airfield, he turned to my mother and yelled "excuse me lady, do you remember; do I land the way the windsock is pointing or do I land away from it?"

My mother said she didn't know.

"Never mind" he said, "I will take potluck".

When they landed at Parafield, they let mum off first and it was then Nobby winked at her and said, "those two nurses will have a tale to tell about the idiot pilot that brought them to Adelaide".

Little did they know that they had been flown by one of the best pilots this country has ever seen. During the War he was senior test pilot for the aircraft factory in Victoria.

Recipe

Peaches and cream cheesecake slice

Serves 16

Preparation time: 20 minutes Cooking time: 1 hour

1/3 cup (80ml) boiling water 50g butter, chopped 1 cup (150g) plain flour 1/4 tsp bicarbonate of soda 1/3 cup (80ml) buttermilk 1 tsp finely grated lemon rind 11/2 cups (330g) caster sugar 3 eggs 500g cream cheese, softened

1 cup (240g) sour cream

1 tsp vanilla extract

3 medium just-ripe white peaches, stoned, cut into wedaes

1/3 cup (75g) caster sugar, extra


1 tbs lemon juice

300ml thickened cream



- 1 Preheat oven to 180 degrees. Grease a 20cm x 30cm lamington pan and line the base and sides with baking paper, allowing the sides to overhang.
- 2 Place the water and butter in a large heatproof bowl. Stir until the butter melts. Add flour, bicarbonate of soda, buttermilk, lemon rind, half the sugar and 1 egg. Whisk until just combined.
- 3 Pour into the prepared pan. Bake for 15 minutes or until a skewer inserted in the centre comes out clean. Remove from oven. Reduce oven to 160 degrees.
- 4 Use an electric mixer to beat the cream cheese, 1/2 cup (120g) sour cream, remaining sugar, remaining eggs and vanilla in a bowl until smooth and well combined. Pour over the base in the pan. Smooth the surface. Bake for 30 minutes or until just set. Set aside in the pan to cool.
- 5 Meanwhile, increase oven to 220 degrees. Line a baking tray with baking paper. Combine peach, extra sugar and lemon juice in a bowl. Place on lined tray. Bake for 12-15 minutes or until caramelised. Cool.
- **6** Use an electric mixer to whisk cream and remaining sour cream in a bowl until firm peaks form. Spoon on top of cheesecake. Top with peach and syrup.
