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WERRILYN HEWETT CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

Welcome to the Autumn edition of the newsletter. A special thanks to Kate Manser who acted in my role while I had five weeks leave - during that time my fifth grandson was born and it was really special being able to spend time with family. Congratulations to Jill Novy and her staff for a very successful food safety audit. The auditor was very impressed by our advanced systems and processes, and awarded the maximum accreditation period.

Recently the Aged Care Quality and Safety Commission made an unannounced visit to Barunga Homes where they reviewed our Infection Control processes and our preparedness for a COVID-19 outbreaks. As soon as the auditors had walked the length of the passage they commented on the special feel of our home and the warmth in the way they were greeted by all House Members, staff and volunteers. The audit was a resounding success with full compliance to all requirements.

The outcomes of the Royal Commission have been very topical, Board Members and senior staff have participated in webinars to fully analyse the recommendations.

There is no doubt there are some providers whose care services have been unacceptable and as a nation we must do better to protect our older people and ensure that they receive the care, respect and dignity they deserve. Whilst I can not speak for other service providers, I can assure the Barunga Village community that we offer a commitment from the Board of Directors through to all levels of staffing, to provide THE BEST LIFE POSSIBLE for our consumers. This does not mean we always get it right and that we can't improve and for this reason we have a range of feedback mechanisms as we genuinely welcome the opportunity to improve where we can. We are continually monitoring and reviewing all areas of service and at every opportunity involve consumers in that process.

In an effort to increase transparency, we are about to install a board in Gloria's Coffee Shop dining area at Barunga Homes where we will be displaying improvements that have occurred as a direct response to people's suggestions. Although not all suggestions can come to fruition, nothing pleases us more than to be able to respond to an idea and make a positive change.

COVID-19 is still with us and we remain bound by the same visiting restrictions in Barunga Homes as outlined in the last newsletter which in summary include:

- Set visiting hours (unless visit is prearranged)
- Screening requirements upon entry
- Visits may only take place in a House Members room or in designated outdoor areas
- Physical distancing must be adhered to

We are currently preparing for those House Members who choose to be vaccinated at Barunga Homes as they qualify in Phase 1A of the immunisation program. We expect Barunga Community Care clients will follow in the next phase.

Where possible we have provided information for consumers in order for them to make an informed choice about the vaccine. Webinars have been held at Barunga Homes and Barunga by the Sea and information has been sent to House Members (or their substitute decision maker) and Barunga Community Care clients.

The resignation of Maureen Coffey has required some significant changes in the organisation and I am both delighted and humbled to have been appointed Chief Executive Officer (CEO).

For 24 years I have shared the CEO role with Maureen and whilst the structure was not a traditional one, it was one that worked successfully for us as we grew the organisation. Maureen has given her heart and soul to Barunga Village and always focused on delivering better outcomes for our consumers. She has been a passionate and dedicated leader who had high expectations and demanded high standards.

Although we will miss Maureen's ideas and wisdom, on behalf of the Barunga Village community I wish her every happiness as she begins the next chapter in her life where she will have time to 'smell the roses' and enjoy some caravanning holidays.

The Board of Directors undertook a rigorous process recruiting externally for a *Director of Corporate Services* and a *Director of Nursing and Care Services* in order to select the best candidates possible.

Samantha Crane was appointed as Director of Corporate Services and Kate Manser as Director of Nursing and Care Services - both Samantha and Kate are existing employees who proved their worthiness to the interviewing panels.

Over the last few years Maureen and I have mentored Samantha and Kate (respectively) and it is the sign of a healthy organisation when young emerging leaders have the opportunity to progress within the organisation.

I am very excited to have Samantha and Kate in the leadership team - they are both extremely loyal and motivated ladies and I have great confidence in their abilities to lead the organisation in a positive direction.


It was a natural choice to appoint Merrilyn when Maureen tendered her resignation in May last year.

Judyth receives Australia Day award

House Member, Judyth Bettess, along with past and present members of the Bute history group were awarded with the Mayor's award for outstanding volunteer services to the Barunga West community on Australia Day. The group, including founding member Judyth were recognised for their efforts and commitment in preserving Barunga West's history and exemplary work in historic preservation in South Australia at the newly renovated Bute town hall.

Judyth Bettess (nee Pontifex) grew up alongside her six siblings on their family farm on the outskirts of Melton. She began her schooling at the local Coconut School, later moving to Kadina where she boarded and attended Kadina Memorial High School. She then married her husband, Jim Bettess in 1949 and moved to Bute.

Judyth and Jim raised their four children, Jim Junior, Anthea, Pauline and Helen on their family farm at Bute. Once her children had grown and left the family home, Judyth chose to pursue her passion in uncovering and preserving the history of Bute and its surrounding district. Judyth set her first task which was to gather the names of the land owners of

the Bute township when it was first established in 1884.

With the names of past land owners, Judyth began speaking to families still in the district and gathered more details about the land, memories and historical information which had been passed down through their families.

With the encouragement and support of her husband, Judyth gathered a small group of like minded women to work with. Obtaining the relevant information involved many trips to the Lands Title office in Adelaide. Judyth did not drive in Adelaide, so she would travel by bus to Adelaide often requiring an overnight stay to source further information.

As the group gained momentum, Judyth wrote to the council requesting the use of the vacant ANZ bank building in Bute as a meeting place for the history group and for a secure storage location for the evergrowing historical documents. The request was approved in 2002.

Once the history group was established in the old bank, people began to come to the site to share their own family history with group members. This led to more historic discoveries about the township of Bute and its surrounding district.

Unlike today, where multitudes of photos are taken through digital platforms such as smartphones, drones and cameras, in the earlier days, photography was rare and inaccessible to many making it so important to preserve any precious photos they uncovered.

Judyth recalls her motivation for establishing the group was her passion for history. She wanted the history of the district to be available for future generations to learn from and to build upon. Judyth is extremely proud to hear that the group continues to function and grow, now including male group members.

Lady Col celebrates her 100th Birthday

On 25 January 2021, House Member, Colin Ailsa Calder Edwards affectionally known at Barunga Homes as Lady Col, celebrated her 100th birthday.

Born in Perth in 1921, Lady Col was raised in Guildford on the Swan River and attended Perth College. In 1941, she enlisted into the Women's Auxiliary Australian Air Force (WAAAF) where her role involved driving trucks.

One evening during the war, Lady Col attended a dance where Clive, a service man from South Australia asked her for a dance and as luck would have it, she had one remaining spot on her dance card. They both enjoyed each others company. Clive's ship set sail two days later, however they kept in contact through letter writing and later married in 1943. After the wedding, Clive once again returned to his duty until the war ended in 1945.

After the war, Lady Col and Clive moved to Torrens Park, South Australia. They were blessed with four sons, Geoff, Doug, Robert and Tony.

Favourite past times of Lady Col included playing golf and tennis. When asked what she believes is the secret for a long and happy life, Lady Col's advice is 'everything in moderation'.

When Lady Col and her husband retired, they spent five months of each year travelling around Australia in a caravan. They continued this annual tradition for 23 years. Together they enjoyed visiting many beautiful places around Australia but it is a little town in Queensland called 1770 that holds special memories for her and her husband.

Lady Col's 100th birthday was celebrated over two days. On 24 January, she gathered with family and friends at the Port Broughton Bowls Club. Lady Col treasures her large attentive family and friends. Unfortunately, due to COVID-19 restrictions, her son Doug along with family members from Auckland and Sydney were sadly missed. On 25 January, Lady Col continued her birthday celebrations at Barunga Homes with fellow House Members. She was overjoyed to receive letters from her Majesty the Queen, the Governor-General of Australia David Hurley and local MP Rowan Ramsey. Lady Col also received many lovely cards and beautiful flowers from the Broken Hill Legacy Association, Perth College and the Old Girls' Association.




At Barunga by the Sea, the directional sign located at the entrance has been replaced. This sign was old and in much need of repair. Since being updated, the new branding colours have been used.

Recipe

Summer plum tart

Serves 8

Preparation time: 20 minutes Cooking time: 45 minutes

Base

125g butter, melted 16 (200g) sponge finger biscuits (Savoiardi)

Filling

125g cream cheese, softened 50g butter, extra, softened 3/4 cup caster sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla 3 eggs 1/4 cup flour 8-9 ripe plums, halved, stones removed 1 tablespoon caster sugar Extra cream, to serve

Base

1. Place butter and biscuits in a food processor and process until mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs.

Filling

1. Beat the cream cheese extra butter, sugar and vanilla using an electric beater until pale and fluffy. Beat in eggs, one at a time, until well combined. Add flour and beat until smooth

2. Pour mixture over base then arrange the plums, cut side down, over the filling.

3. Sprinkle with extra sugar and bake in a moderately hot oven 190°C for 40 minutes or until golden, cool slightly and remove from pan. Slice and serve warm or cold with cream.
